CONCEPTS AND TERMINOLOGIES

Baseline: A baseline is an analysis describing the initial state of an indicator before the start of a project/programme, against which progress can be assessed or comparisons made.

Bottom-up Economic Transformation Agenda: It is an economic model which aims at economic turnaround and uplifting the lives and livelihoods of those at the bottom of the pyramid through a value chain approach.

Green Economy: The green economy is defined as an economy that results in improved human well-being and social equity, while significantly reducing environmental risks and ecological scarcities. The policy framework for the green economy and green growth in Kenya is designed to support a globally competitive low-carbon development path through promoting economic resilience and resource efficiency, sustainable management of natural resources, development of sustainable infrastructure and providing support for social inclusion. The Green Economy Strategy and Implementation Plan (GESIP) 2016 aims to guide the National and County Governments as well as other actors to adopt development pathways with higher and more efficient growth, cleaner environment, and higher productivity.

Indicator: An indicator is a sign of progress /changes that result from your project. It measures a change in a situation or condition and confirms progress towards the achievement of a specific result. It is used to measure a project's impact, outcomes, outputs, and inputs that are monitored during project implementation to assess progress.

Outcome Indicator: This is a specific, observable, and measurable characteristic or change that will represent the achievement of the outcome. Outcome indicators include quantitative and qualitative measures. Examples: Enrolment rates, transition rates, mortality rates etc.

Outcome: Measures the intermediate results generated relative to the objective of the intervention. It describes the actual change in conditions/situation as a result of an intervention output(s) such as changed practices as a result of a programme or project.

Output: Immediate result from conducting an activity i.e. goods and services produced.
Performance indicator: A measurement that evaluates the success of an organization or of a particular activity (such as projects, programmes, products and other initiatives) in which it engages.

Programme: It is a grouping of similar projects and/or services performed by a National/County Department to achieve a specific objective. The Programmes must be mapped to strategic objectives. **Project:** A project is a set of coordinated activities implemented to meet specific objectives within defined time, cost and performance parameters. Projects aimed at achieving a common goal form a programme.

Sectors: Is a composition of departments, agencies and organizations that are grouped according to the services and products they provide. They produce or offer similar or related products and services, and share common operating characteristics.

Target: A target refers to the planned level of an indicator achievement.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The County Annual Development Plan (CADP) 2025/2026 is the third Annual Development Plan implementing the County Integrated Development Plan 2023/2027. The plan outlines the County Government's priority strategic interventions and programmes that will be implemented in the FY 2025/2026. The plan is prepared in observance to provided guidelines by the National Treasury and State Department of Planning and the attendant legal provisions in the Public Finance Management Act 2012, Section 126, and in accordance with Article 220 (2) of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010.

The Meru County Annual Development plan has taken into consideration the aspirations of the county's long-term vision of 'The aspiration for sustainable development'. The plan is structured along international and national plans including the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), Kenya Vision 2030, Meru Vision 2040 and draft spatial plans for towns.

The following critical areas have been identified that require immediate attention: Public service delivery financial management; Natural resources development; Education; Food security; Infrastructure development; Investment promotion; Social security and Health services. The achievement of the set objectives will be driven well-developed multisector approach to resource mobilization and a resilient community on development. The county envisages an environment that will support the communities in building resilience under environment that is efficient and offers space for decent social economic growth.

The ADP has been organized in five Chapters.

Chapter one presents an overview of the county including the rationale for the preparation, the linkage of the CADP with other development plans, and the process of developing the plan.

Chapter two reviews implementation of the FY 2023/2024 Annual Development Plan (ADP) providing Financial performance including revenue performance, expenditure analysis, and pending bills; Sector/sub-sector key achievements; Status of projects; Issuance of Grants, Benefits and Subsidies; Contribution of achievements to the National, Regional and International aspirations/concerns; Challenges encountered; Emerging issues; Lessons learnt during the implementation of the previous plan; Recommendations; and Development issues arising.

Chapter three presents sector/sub-sector strategic priorities, programmes and projects for the Financial Year as indicated in the CADP. They also include information on grants, benefits, and subsidies to be issued by the County Government during the plan period, where applicable. In addition, linkages on various planned programmes and projects to the National, Regional, and international aspirations such as BETA, Vision 2030 and its MTPs, the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, and Climate Change mitigation, among others are elaborated

Chapter four has the resource allocation framework for the plan with an analysis on the expected county revenue and modalities for resource mobilization. It provides the development financing needs, indicative program costs, and a summary of risks, assumptions and mitigation measures.

Chapter five explains the means of monitoring and evaluating the plan, and a summary of key indicators with the targets to be achieved once the plan is implemented. The methods and tools for data collection, analysis and reporting, key output indicators, and outcomes adapted to measure performance are also included.

Annexures: this section provides for the capital and non-capital projects for the FY 2025/26 and flagship projects. Further the section provides the projects proposed during the ward wide public participation fora.

CHAPTER ONE

INTRODUCTION

1.1 Overview of the County

Meru County, one of the forty-seven counties in Kenya, is situated in the eastern region of the country. It encompasses an area of 6,936.2 square kilometers, of which 972.3 square kilometers are designated as forest reserves. The county is uniquely positioned along the equator, extending from 06° North to 01° South, and lies between longitudes 37° West and 38° East. Meru County shares its borders with four neighboring counties: Isiolo to the north, Nyeri to the southwest, Tharaka-Nithi to the southeast, and Laikipia to the west. The county's location on the eastern slopes of Mount Kenya, along the equator, significantly influences its natural conditions. The altitude within the county varies from 300 meters to 5,199 meters above sea level, resulting in diverse atmospheric conditions that foster a wide range of microclimates and agro-ecological zones.

1.1.1 Economic Activities

The economy of Meru County is predominantly reliant on agriculture, with both crop farming and livestock rearing being widely practiced. Agricultural activities are prevalent across all sub-counties, with particularly intensive practices observed in the Imenti and Buuri sub-counties. Livestock farming is more common in the Tigania, North Igembe, and Buuri sub-counties. The majority of the population is engaged in subsistence farming, cultivating staple crops such as maize, beans, sorghum, millet, cabbages, and various fruits. Commercial farming, on the other hand, focuses on the cultivation of tea, coffee, macadamia, Khat (Miraa), and wheat/barley in different regions of the county. Horticulture and floriculture also play significant roles in the local economy, particularly within Buuri Sub-County. The county is home to several prominent tea processing factories, including Kionyo, Githongo, Michimikuru, Kiegoi, and Imenti Tea Factories. Livestock farming in Meru County includes dairy and beef production, as well as the rearing of chickens, goats, sheep, and pigs for both commercial and subsistence purposes. Meru County is particularly renowned for the large-scale cultivation of Khat (Miraa), a lucrative cash crop predominantly grown in the Igembe and Tigania regions. Khat farming is a significant economic activity, generating substantial revenue in the local and export markets. Additionally, the county is witnessing the emergence of a mining industry, primarily focused on the extraction of building materials, including quarrying, gravel, and sand harvesting.

1.1.2 Climate and Weather

The climate of Meru County can be characterized as temperate, with both cool and warm conditions. Annual rainfall distribution varies significantly across the county, with the lower midlands in the north receiving approximately 300mm per year, while the southeastern regions receive up to 2,500mm annually. Other areas in the county experience an average of 1,250mm of rainfall per year. Meru County experiences two distinct rainy seasons: the long rains occur from mid-March to May, while the short rains span from October to December. Temperature fluctuations are notable, ranging from a low of 8°C during the colder months to a high of 32°C during the hotter periods. Generally, temperatures range from 16°C during the cold season to 23°C in the warm season. Meru County experiences an average annual rainfall of between 500 millimeters and 2,600 millimeters. The county's altitude varies significantly, ranging from 300 meters to 5,199 meters above sea level, contributing to the diverse climatic conditions observed throughout the region.

1.1.3 Administrative units

The administrative structure for the County Government of Meru comprises of fifteen (15) sub-counties. Consequently, administrative parameters and logistical considerations related to service delivery are closely linked to the county's development planning, particularly in terms of resource mobilization and spatial planning.

1.1.4 Political Units

Meru County is composed of Nine (9) parliamentary constituencies, as follows: South Imenti, Imenti Central, North Imenti, Buuri, Tigania East, Tigania West, Igembe Central, Igembe South, and Igembe North. Additionally, the County has forty five (45) electoral wards, one special ward and a total of 392 villages.

1.1.5 Demographic Profile

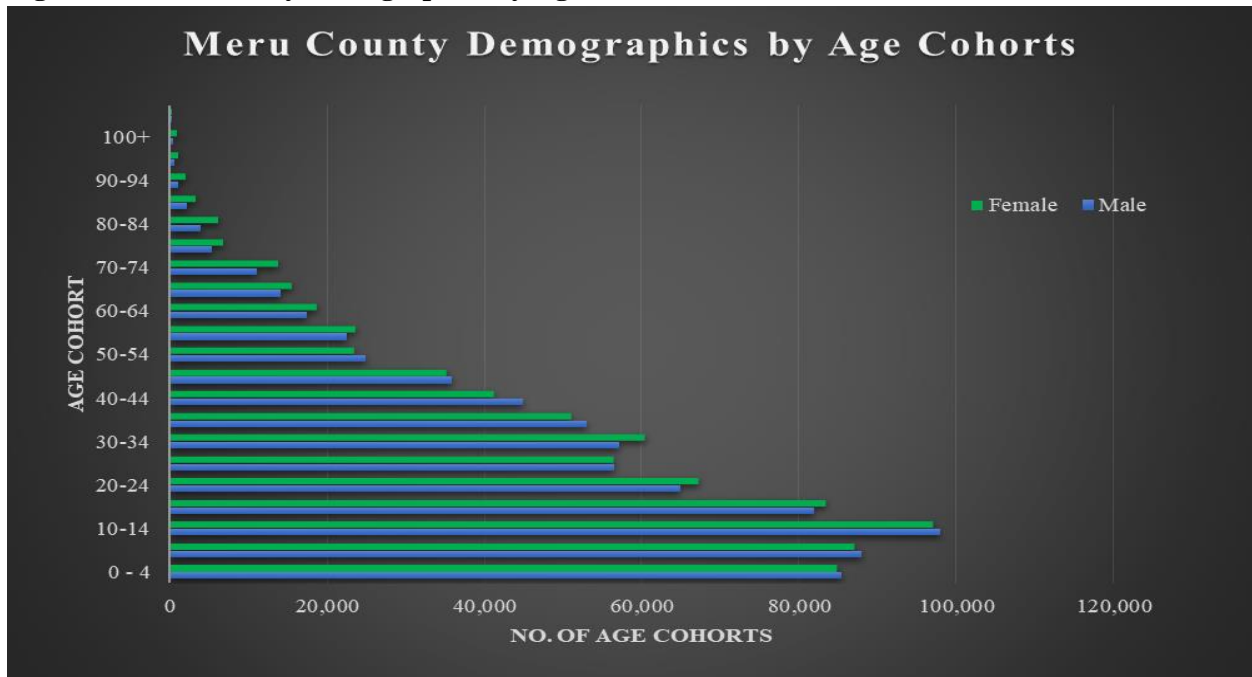
According to the 2019 Kenya Population and Housing Census, the total population of Meru County was recorded at 1,545,714, an increase from 1,356,301 in the 2009 census. Of this population, 767,698 individuals are male, while 777,975 are female, with 41 individuals classified as intersex. Projections indicate that by the year 2040, the population of Meru County is expected to reach 2,353,500. The county's population growth rate is estimated at 2.1 percent per annum. This growth in population is anticipated to exert pressure on available resources, including land, water, and natural resources; however, it also presents opportunities for development and expansion.

Further according to the 2019 census report, the total number of households in Meru County stood at 426,360, with an average of 3.6 individuals per household. The urban households accounted for 50,910, while the rural households numbered 375,450. The total urban population was recorded at 138,913,

comprising 68,166 males and 70,747 females; with approximately 58 percent residing in Meru Town. The county's demographic dividend window is projected to open by 2023, provided the current fertility and mortality rates remain stable. Meru County's Human Development Index is positioned above the national average. The total rural population was 1,406,796, consisting of 699,532 males and 707,228 females.

As per the 2019 Kenya Population and Housing Census (KPHC), population density within Meru County's fifteen (15) sub-counties varies significantly, with the county's overall average density being 221 persons per square kilometer. Igembe Central Sub-County recorded the highest population, with 221,412 residents, while Tigania East Sub-County registered the lowest population, with 72,549 residents.

1.1.6 Infrastructure Development

Meru County has a road network totaling 5,968 kilometers. This network consists of 582 kilometers (10%) of paved roads, 581 kilometers (11%) of gravel roads, and 4,805 kilometers (79%) of earth roads. Among the paved roads, Buuri Sub-County has the largest share with 114 kilometers, followed by North Imenti with 103.92 kilometers, South Imenti with 95.8 kilometers, Tigania East with 60.08 kilometers, Tigania West with 56.33 kilometers, Igembe Central with 54.34 kilometers, Central Imenti with 40 kilometers, Igembe North with 28.82 kilometers, and Igembe South with 22.96 kilometers, the least connected. The maintenance of this road network is overseen by various road agencies, including the Kenya Rural Roads Authority (KeRRA), the Kenya Urban Roads Authority (KURA), the Kenya National Highways Authority (KeNHA), and the County Government. Notably, the county government is responsible for the upkeep of 80% of the earth roads. The county is also served by the Isiolo International Airport, along with airstrips such as Gaitu and Mitunguu, which are in need of upgrades. Additionally, several bus parks within the county have been upgraded. The County Government of Meru has prioritized investment in Information and Communication Technology (ICT) to enhance governance and service delivery. The majority of the community relies on radio, television, and newspapers as their primary sources of information. The county

also maintains an active website (<http://meru.go.ke/>) with a 98.9% uptime, serving as a reliable source of government information, including news updates, tenders, job advertisements, and other public notices.

According to the 2019 census report, access to clean and sustainable energy sources remains limited in Meru County. The percentage distribution of lighting energy sources by households in the county is as follows: 40.2% for electricity, 13.9% for tin lamps, 11% for lanterns, 18.8% for solar, 1.5% for firewood, 0.2% for gas lamps, 0.5% for pressure lamps, and 13.9% for other lighting energy sources. The percentage distribution of cooking fuel sources by households is: 74.3% firewood, 9.8% charcoal, 2.2% paraffin, 12.6% LPG, 0.5% biogas, 0.5% electricity, and 0.1% solar. To address this issue, Meru County has mapped its energy potential, including solar, wind, and small hydropower, and is partnering with private investors to generate energy from these renewable sources.

1.3 Preparation Process of the Annual Development Plan

In the preparation of the County's Annual Development Plan for the Fiscal Year 2025/26, both primary and secondary data were utilized. Extensive consultations were conducted with delivery units, including directorates and boards, Public through public participation fora as well as with the County Assembly, which submitted their proposed programs and projects. The Department of Finance, Economic Planning, and ICT led this process, ensuring that all departments aligned their programs and projects with the County Integrated Development Plan (CIDP) 2023-2027, accompanied by realistic costing. The department adhered to relevant national government policies, plans, and strategies, particularly the Medium-Term Plan IV and the Meru County Vision 2040. Moreover, the compilation of the plan was carried out in accordance with the Draft Guidelines for the Preparation of County Annual Development Plans, as issued by the National Treasury and Planning.

1.4 Legal Basis for the Preparation of the ADP and the Link with CIDP and the Budget

1.4.1 Legal Basis

The Annual Development Plan 2025/26 for Meru County represents a significant milestone in outlining the county's development priorities. This plan has been prepared in compliance with Section 126(1) of the Public Finance Management Act, 2012, which mandates that every County Government must develop a plan in accordance with Article 220(2) of the Constitution, encompassing the following:

- Strategic priorities for the medium term that reflect the county government's priorities and plans;
- A description of how the county government is responding to changes in the financial and economic environment;
- Programmes to be delivered with details for each programme;
- The strategic priorities to which the programme will contribute;
- The services or goods to be provided;
- Measurable indicators of performance where feasible;
- The budget allocated to the programme;
- Payments to be made on behalf of the county government, including details of any grants, benefits and subsidies that are to be paid
- A description of significant capital developments;
- A detailed description of proposals with respect to the development of physical, intellectual, human and other resources of the county, including measurable indicators where those are feasible;
- A summary budget in the format required by regulations; and
- Such other matters as may be required by the Constitution or this Act.

1.4.2 The Link with CIDP and the Budget

The County Integrated Development Plan (CIDP) 2023-2027 serves as a comprehensive roadmap for development within the county over a five-year period. It outlines the county government's strategic medium-term priorities, detailing specific goals and objectives, an implementation plan, provisions for monitoring and evaluation, and a clear reporting mechanism. Accordingly, this Annual Development Plan (ADP) will focus on achieving the second-year targets set out in the CIDP, while also ensuring the completion of ongoing projects from the ADP 2023/24.

The County's annual budget is a financial plan for the year, formulated based on the priorities identified in the Annual Development Plan. The budget is designed to operationalize the objectives articulated in the CIDP and as specified in the Annual Development Plan.

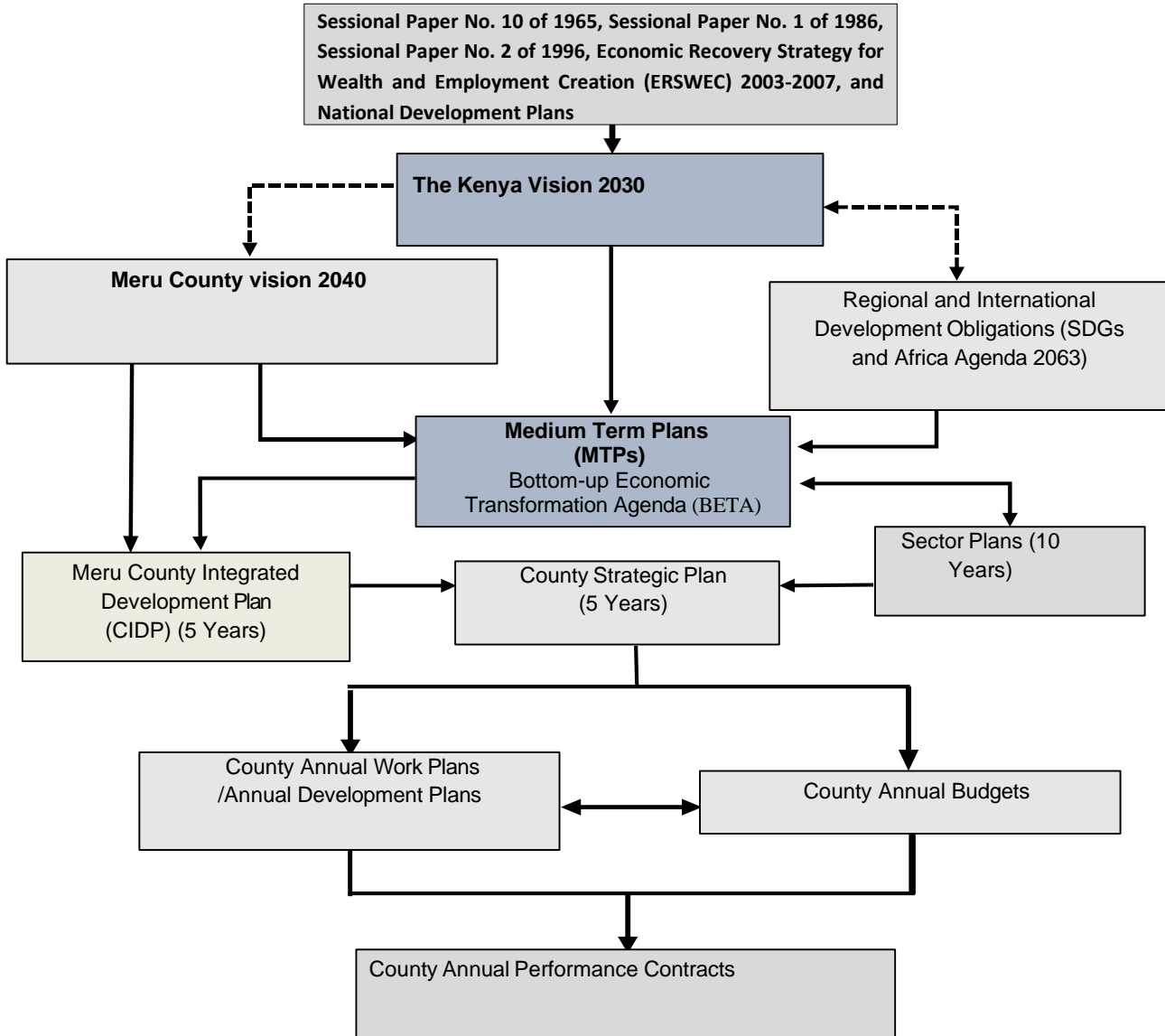
1.4.3 Link with the Meru Vision 2040

Meru Vision 2040 serves as the county's strategic blueprint for steering the development agenda over the next 16 years. This development framework is anchored on four fundamental pillars - Economic, Social, Political, and Enablers - and includes key county flagship projects and other priority initiatives, all aimed at driving Meru County towards economic prosperity and specialization.

Spearheaded by the Meru Economic and Social Council, Meru Vision 2040 has identified key competencies that provide Meru County with a comparative advantage, following extensive consultations with the people of Meru. Consequently, the Annual Development Plan has integrated programs, projects, and initiatives earmarked for implementation during the Vision's short-term planning period. A diagrammatic

representation of the connection between the ADP, Meru Vision 2040, the CIDP, and the budget is illustrated in Figure 1.

CHAPTER TWO

2.3 Sector Achievements in the Previous FY 2023/24

This section presents a summary of the key accomplishments across various sectors during the FY 2023/24 planning period. It looks at the performance indicators and shows the level of achievements.

2.3.1 County Assembly

During the year under review the County Assembly made notable progress across its programs aimed at enhancing legislation, oversight, and administrative efficiency. Under Programme 1: Legislation and Representation, which focused on building the law-making and representative capabilities of assembly members, several significant achievements were made. While the target to enact 10 bills fell short with only 3 bills enacted, substantial progress was evident in other areas. The assembly surpassed its baseline by adopting 130 motions, a marked improvement from the previous 77. Additionally, it approved 31 statements and considered 10 petitions, both exceeding their respective targets of 5, demonstrating an enhanced capacity for representation and responsiveness to community issues.

In Programme 2: Legislative Oversight, aimed at strengthening budget oversight, public awareness, and accountability, the assembly fully met its goals. All 3 targeted budget documents were approved, supporting sound financial governance. Furthermore, the assembly exceeded its target for public participation by holding 6 forums instead of the planned 5, thereby fostering greater community involvement. Capacity building was also a success, with 69 Members of the County Assembly (MCAs) receiving training, hitting the target precisely and ensuring members were well-prepared to execute their oversight responsibilities.

Programme 3: Administration Management, Planning, and Support of County Affairs was designed to improve professionalism, develop human resource capacity, and provide necessary infrastructure. The assembly achieved 99.9% of its targeted recurrent expenditure, significantly surpassing the original target of 68%, thereby enhancing workspace quality and ensuring improved accessibility and mobility, especially for Persons with Disabilities.

2.3.2 Office of the Governor

During the period under review the department managed to bolster citizen satisfaction with service delivery which rose from 60% to 99%, supported by an increase in Governor's forums (from 2 to 24) and a 100% completion of field visits to priority projects, generating valuable reports for decision-making. To ensure value, quality and risk reduction the department conducted comprehensive monitoring and verification for both priority projects and health facilities. The conduction of staff appraisals to all (100%) promoted accountability and a performance-driven culture.

In addition, the Department was able to disseminate 90% early warning that enhanced community preparedness and 32 peace-building meetings which fostered stability. Further, the Department provided critical relief supplies, including 5,000 non-food items (NFIs) and food provisions, were distributed to support vulnerable population that enhanced their socio-economic well-being during crises. 4 funding proposals were submitted to possible donors highlighted proactive resource mobilization. The increased aired features on government activities (from 5 to 12) improved public engagement while strong departmental collaboration within the 10 County Departments reinforced effective, consistent service delivery.

2.3.3 Finance, Economic Planning & ICT

During the period under review, the department of finance, Economic Planning & ICT prepared all statutory documents within the stimulated timeframes. The statutory documents included: Annual Development Plan (ADP) 2024/2025, County Annual Progress Report for FY 2023/2024, County Budget Review and Outlook Paper (CBROP) 2023 and County Fiscal Strategy Paper (CFSP) 2024. The plan was intended is intended to guide the annual planning, budgeting process and to facilitate the implementation and monitoring of projects and programmes in each department or agency of the County Government.

The department through the directorate of ICT installed fibre connection to Meru County Revenue Board, New headquarter and Municipality, this was to enhance revenue collection management. Meru County Revenue Board (MCRB) installed drainage covers within Meru Municipality, which has increased parking slots hence more parking revenue, opened and operationalized Makutano open air market and opened and allocated stages in Makutano and Gitimbine hence increased compliance in monthly parking among others. Loans worth Kshs. 50 Million were disbursed through the Meru County Microfinance Corporation (MCMC) uplifting livelihood and accelerating county growth.

2.3.4 Education, Science Culture & Arts

During the period under review, the department through the directorate of Early Childhood Development, disbursed capitation to 777 ECDE centres for school meals and nutrition program at a cost of KShs. 31 Million. The department also disbursed Ksh. 10 Million for construction of 4 model ECDE centres, disbursed Kshs. 136M retention enhancement fund for benefiting 51, 557 students. This increased ECDE enrolment by 93% and retention of pupils by 98%.

The department through the directorate of Technical and Vocational Education and Training disbursed conditional grants/capitation of Kshs. 28.68 million to 30 vocational training centres benefiting 1912 trainees. This increased trainees that graduated by 56%. The directorate also disbursed conditional grants to construct 2 workshops and 1 ablution block benefiting 1 VTC. This shall increase workshop trainee ratio to 1:34. Further, the department, through the directorate of culture did a documentary on cultural heritage sites, finished the construction of phase one Njuri Ncheke cultural centre and participated in Kenya Music and Cultural Festival (KMCF) at the national level and Kenya Inter Counties Sports and Cultural Association (KICOSCA) festivals.

2.3.5 Youth Affairs, Meru Youth Service Board, Sports, Gender & Social Development

During the period under review the department managed to issue Motorbikes to youth groups across the wards worth Ksh 2,200,000, procured a studio proofing for Maua studio. Also, the procurement of PSL 2700 diesel carwash machines and Procurement of plastic water tanks for Youth groups empowerment. This initiative not only supports youth empowerment but also fosters entrepreneurship and local economic development. Through the MYS Intake 2023, 291 young people were successfully recruited and trained in paramilitary drills, mindset, and discipline. Through Youth empowerment, 284 youths were enrolled to the Meru National Polytechnic to Pursue Craft Proficiency Courses in house management, provision of professional security and Dairy farm management. Out of the 284 service men/women who matriculated to the Meru National Polytechnic, 98% has seamlessly transitioned into the job market and other gainful forms of employment.

In addition, the department made KICOSCA annual subscription payments, carried out selection and training and overseeing participation in the 10th edition of Kenya inter-county sports and cultural games in Meru where Meru County participated in 13 sports disciplines. Also, we Procured and equipped KICOSCA and community teams with sports equipment and uniform, procured ward-based Sports Equipment and Uniforms for 39 Wards in Meru County amounting to Kshs42,750,000; carried out the Second phase of upgrading Maua Stadium using 5M and Leveling of School ground at Kainginyo, Nguyoyo, Kaorune, Mwiteria, Mpinda, Itumbi, Thimbili and Thambiro primary school. Collectively, these efforts not only promoted sports development but also contributed to empowerment through increased engagement in recreational activities.

Further, to enhance social welfare, gender equality, and improved health outcomes within the community, the department through Gender and Social Development started the construction of a Rehabilitation Centre at Kiirua /Naari ward at cost of Ksh 33 milion. A total of 1,666 beneficiaries for the NHIF elderly insurance cover in the 45 wards to enhance their lifestyle through accessibility to proper health care were reached. On women empowerment programme the groups have been identified money to be disbursed amounting to Ksh 24M. Rolling out of training in the 45 Wards where women were trained on financial literacy and entrepreneurship. Procurement of standard wheel chairs, paediatric wheel chairs, standard white cane and walking sticks; all for Ksh 10M; identification and training 3,000 adolescents on teenage pregnancies, health hygiene and life skills; supply of sanitary and dignity kits to vulnerable girls and PWDs across the county and capacity building on GBV and FGM to vulnerable and marginalized groups across Meru County.

2.3.6 Road, Transport and Energy

During the period under review the department managed to open 210 km of roads, graded 210 KM of roads and rehabilitated roads in the wards through gravelling. In addition, 544 M² culverts were

constructed, 4 box culverts and 470 gabions installed. This ensured that road connectivity and accessibility is improved significantly. This further improved security and stimulated economic growth for the population.

To improve access to energy, 195 floodlights were installed under the county and REREC matching grant programme and over 300 were repaired, this enhanced security and improve business environment. The department further developed the county energy plan that aims to improve the energy sector. The County Energy Plan highlight key strategies to address access to reliable and quality supply of clean cooking and lighting energy, resource mobilization, capacity building and overall development of energy infrastructure for access to affordable quality energy.

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2.3.7 Legal Affairs, Public Service Management and Administration

During the year under review the department covered 100% of the staff Under Comprehensive Medical and WIBA Insurance which enhanced staff well-being, promoted job satisfaction and reduced absenteeism due to health-related issues. The performance management system successfully achieved a 100% target for staff appraisals for members under this category that promoted accountability and continuous improvement within the organization, ensuring that staff performance aligned with departmental goals. In addition, to enhance operational efficiency and supports timely legal processes, the department through Legal Affairs establishment a dedicated space for the legal registry and library which reduced time taken to retrieve court files and other legal documents and provided a safe storage of County Government Legislation leading efficiency in the administration of justice within the county.

Further, the construction of 2 Sub-County Offices and Deployment of 2 Sub-County Administrators improved accessibility to government services for residents in those areas hence facilitating better service delivery and strengthening of local governance by bringing administrative functions closer to the community.

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2.3.8 Trade, Tourism & Co-operative Development

During the period under review the department managed to renovate and repair 8 markets, constructed 3 modern market toilets, trained 2,000 entrepreneurs on entrepreneur skills and empowered 52 groups with Viwanda Mashinani equipment. This ensured improved conducive business environment, enhanced trade activities as well as improved industrial activities and increased number of skilled and empowered entrepreneurs.

The department was also able to provide 9 coffee moistures and distributed 12,300 tree seedlings to cooperative societies and registered 26 new cooperative societies. This has enhanced capacity building for cooperatives and improved the livelihood of the members.

2.3.9 Health Services

During FY2023/24, access to quality health services saw a notable increase, with 26,100 individuals benefiting from improved services. Despite challenges, efforts to reduce the incidence of food and waterborne diseases achieved a modest 0.18% reduction. In the area of sanitation, one new facility was established that is friendly to persons with disabilities, and sanitation improvements continued with a 0.03% increase. The incidence of communicable diseases was reduced by 20.9%, and overall disease burden decreased by 2%. Health-seeking behaviour was notably enhanced, with a significant 144 individuals showing increased engagement. Specific disease prevention efforts included the reduction of TB cases to 244 and a targeted increase in HIV testing services, achieving a 0.763% uptake in both testing and ART services.

During the same period under review, significant strides were made in enhancing maternal health services and community engagement. Six (6) outreach missions were conducted in remote areas, providing 295 women with essential maternal health services, including antenatal care, ultrasounds, tetanus vaccinations, and iron and folic acid supplements. Meru County continued to show unwavering commitment to the Team Mum Supervision approach. Extensive mentorship and support supervision were carried out across 24 health facilities, ensuring the consistent delivery of quality care.

Furthermore, the establishment of Sexual and Gender-Based Violence Technical Working Groups (SGBVTWG) in all sub-counties marked a significant achievement in addressing and combating gender-based violence. Complementing this, 20 community dialogue sessions were held across all sub-counties, reaching 1,000 individuals, thereby fostering greater awareness and understanding of these critical issues. 100 healthcare workers were trained on child protection and safeguarding underscored our commitment to the safety and well-being of children. Through collaboration with key stakeholders, six children who were sexually abused by close relatives were successfully rescued and placed in safe environments.

2.3.10 Agriculture, Livestock and Fisheries

During the year under review, the Emergency Locust Response Programme (ELRP) was implemented across 15 wards. Key activities focused on supporting local communities with essential agricultural inputs. Funds were transferred to the Community Driven Development Committees (CDDCs) for the purchase of farm inputs, including agricultural materials, supplies, and small equipment. Additionally, support was extended to livestock input initiatives, which included the purchase of livestock. The program also facilitated inclusion grants for four Producer Organizations and nine SACCOs, while

executing various other activities aimed at reducing the impact of locust invasions and enhancing agricultural resilience.

The National Agricultural Value Chain Development Project covered the entire county, with numerous sub-counties participating in farmer profiling and registration. The project further engaged in Participatory Integrated Community Development (PICD) workshops across these sub-counties. Additionally, the program facilitated the release of Financial Inclusion Management Grants (FIMG) to support Ward-Based SACCOs in multiple wards, aimed at fostering financial inclusion and supporting local economies.

The National Agricultural and Rural Inclusive Growth Project (NARIGP) also had a significant impact, with activities spread across the County. One notable achievement was the modernization of the Kiangua Farmers' Cooperative Society, which helped improve the quality and efficiency of agricultural practices. A potato ambient store was proposed for construction in Kibirichia Ward, helping to store produce and reduce post-harvest losses. The program continued its efforts to empower local SACCOs by releasing Inclusion Grants in several wards, including Kiegoi/Antobochiu, Akirangondu, Antuambui, Ntunene, and many others. Additionally, the program supported the procurement of an avocado processing line for Abogeta West Ward, promoting value addition and market access for farmers.

In the Aquaculture Business Development Programme (ABDP), which was primarily focused on Imenti North and South, the distribution of pond liners played a crucial role in promoting sustainable fish farming. A total of 161 pond liners were distributed to farmers in Imenti South, while 49 pond liners were given to beneficiaries in Imenti North, thereby enhancing aquaculture productivity in these areas.

Under the General Extension Services of the Department of Agriculture, Livestock, and Fisheries (DALF), the department focused on procuring essential inputs, including fish feeds, dam fishing equipment, and bull semen to support livestock and aquaculture farmers. Additionally, grafted avocado seedlings were provided to various wards such as Akachiu, Kibirichia, and Abothuguchi Central to enhance agricultural production. Another notable achievement was the renovation of the irrigation borehole at Gitumbi in Amugaa, which supported farmers with reliable water sources for their crops and livestock.

The Small-Scale Irrigation and Value Addition Project (SIVAP) aimed to improve water access and market infrastructure in various wards, including Muthara, Abothuguchi West, Kiirua-Naari, Kisima, and others. The program facilitated the drilling and equipping of 24 boreholes in 18 wards, ensuring a steady water supply for irrigation and livestock use. Furthermore, a market construction project in Muthara Ward provided local farmers with a more organized platform to sell their produce. SIVAP also contributed to the development of sports road improvements in several wards, such as Kisima and Thangatha, improving transportation access for rural communities. Additionally, the program funded income-generating activities, including the provision of dairy goats in Abothuguchi West and support for cereal stores in Mikinduri.

The Agricultural Sector Development Support Programme (ASDSP II) also made a significant contribution to agricultural development across various wards, including Mwanganthia, Giaki, Nkomo, Mikinduri, Amwathi, Mbeu, Ntima East, Kiagu, and others. The program focused on promoting conservation agriculture equipment, such as walking tractors and shallow weeders, to improve farming practices. It also introduced drought-tolerant sorghum seeds and Aflasafe to combat aflatoxin contamination. The program further supported livestock farmers through the provision of estrous

synchronization services with sexed semen in multiple wards, as well as the installation of animal feed mills in selected areas. Other initiatives included the promotion of mobile sorghum threshers and motorbike sets, which helped improve the efficiency of grain processing.

Through these various programs, the county has made significant strides in improving agricultural productivity, promoting financial inclusion, and enhancing value-added agricultural services. These activities have not only addressed immediate challenges, such as locust invasions, but have also laid the groundwork for sustainable economic growth and development in the region.

2.3.11 Lands, Physical and Public Works

During the year under review, under the Land Administration and Management sub-program, the goal was to secure land tenure by closing active adjudication sections. However, only 10% of these sections were registered and closed, falling short of the 30% target due to delays from the National Land Commission (NLC). In the Urban Infrastructure Development and Municipalities sub-program, the county exceeded its target by achieving a 30% growth in infrastructure and investment in urban areas, surpassing the planned 20%. This growth was significantly supported by funding from the Kenya Informal Settlements Improvement Project (KISIP), benefiting infrastructure in informal settlements.

The Physical Planning sub-program successfully met its target of mapping and planning 50% of the county's regions, supported by cadastral plans, thus creating secure and accessible environments for living and working. In Housing and Informal Settlements, the county aimed for a 20% compliance with building standards but was unable to measure progress due to the absence of a housing inspectorate. Human Resource Development efforts were fully met, with 20 staff members trained to build a more professional and skilled workforce. Lastly, the Digital Land Governance Programme aimed to enhance land governance by digitizing land records. The county surpassed its 20% target, achieving 40% digitization with the establishment of a GIS lab, greatly improving the efficiency of land management.

2.3.12 Water and Irrigation, Environment, Natural Resources and Climate Change

During the period under review the department was able to drill, equip and test 9 boreholes and others are in progress, increased households with access to safe and clean water by 13544 HH, Increased number of households connected and supplied storage tanks to 998 HH. 3 projects were subjected to ESIA (removal of asbestos at Water HQ offices, Maintenance of Nkunga and Murera dumpsites respectively). This enhanced access to safe and clean water, improved water infrastructure and ensured compliance with environmental standards, contributing to a healthier and more sustainable living environment for the community.

To enhance environmental sustainability and climate resilience, the department carried out the exercise of planting 67,000 tree seedlings in all the Constituencies during the October to December 2023 rainy season. The department has also launched and sensitized Ward Climate Change Planning Committees in all the 45 wards through FLLoCA program. Both Nkunga and Murera dumpsites were fenced and gates installed, watchmen house and toilets were constructed, excavating and compacting of solid wastes done all at a cost of Kshs. 13.52 million this financial year, 1 skip loader and 13 skip bins were procured. 1 staff training held on FLLoCA program grant and proposal vetting and 3 county environmental greening days have been held (international wetland day, World Wetland Day and National tree planting day).

2.7 Challenges faced by County Departments

- i. **Budget constraint**-The county government face budget constraint that restricts funding for vital projects, often resulting from limited allocations; high demand for the services, rising costs, delayed Exchequer releases among others. During the implementation of the ADP FY 2023/2024, this led to rising pending bills across the departments, insufficient Capital Project Financing, Inadequate training sessions and capacity building, decrease in the number of operational ambulances, incomplete or stalled projects, Inadequate construction and maintenance funding for the implementation of clean cooking projects among others.
- ii. **Environmental degradation**. This has been driven by the consistent Climate Change. Rapid urban growth, industrial activities and poor waste management harm ecosystems causing erosion, water pollution and air quality issues. Limited resources restrict county’s ability to effectively address this challenge.
- iii. **Inadequate market information system & linkages**- most of the agricultural commodities are sold in raw form without any value addition thereby fetching low prices in the market. Existence of Middlemen in the market has affected the agricultural returns reducing wealth accumulation for investment.
- iv. **High dependency on rain-fed Agriculture**- In the recent past there has been a major change in weather patterns. This has greatly affected the quantity and quality of agricultural produce from the rain fed agriculture hence reducing the income.
- v. **High population growth**-Population growth poses several challenges in the county. These challenges include health issues, environmental degradation, strained infrastructure, economic pressures urban overcrowding and many more across the departments. During the implementation

of the ADP FY 2023/24, Health issues varied from limited progress in Healthcare Coverage and Service to decline in maternal, child and reproductive health.

- vi. **Vandalism of county projects** –This includes the intentional destruction, damage or theft of public infrastructure and assets meant to serve the Community. This leads to disruption of essential services provision to the community, such as water supply, sanitation, transportation, and education, affecting the daily lives of residents. Repairing vandalized projects require time and resources, diverting funds from other development initiatives and potentially delaying progress on other important projects.
- vii. **Inadequate staff training.** Lack of adequate staff training is a key challenge for the County, restricting employee’s effectiveness in service delivery and project management, Low adoption of new technologies among others. It also hinders professional growth leading to lower job satisfaction. There is need for the county to invest in ingoing training programmes to develop a skilled workforce.
- viii. **Human resource-**Adherence to fiscal responsibility principle of the share of staff emoluments in the budget has left the County unable to employ staff in some sectors. Despite the rising population and demand of services, the human resource remains lean and inadequate to effectively provide services. The continual loss of staff due to natural attrition coupled with weak succession planning further complicates the situation. Funding for staff capacity building has also been inadequate to cover for training costs of staff.
- ix. **Inadequate conceptualization and scoping of projects.** This involves the initial phase of projects planning that lays the groundwork for projects. It involves assessing needs, identifying stakeholders, defining goals and objectives, outlining the project scope, conducting a feasibility study, and evaluating potential risks. Most projects do not have end to-end concepts and therefore scoping is done based on available funds. Without project concepts it is impossible to determine the project components, the costing and the timelines for implementation.
- x. **Lack of programmes policies and procedures.** This gap often leads to inconsistent services, funds mismanagements and also hampers the effective response to community needs. Establishing clear policies is crucial for efficiency, transparency and sustainable development.

2.8 Emerging Issues

- i. Political Instability in the country/County with a rise of demonstrations from a generation of young people known as Gen Z.
- ii. Climate change issues resulting to increased drought, pollution, uncontrolled effluent disposal and emergence of new waste streams.

2.9 Lessons Learnt

- i. **Political differences.** This can affect service delivery despite meticulous planning and as such contingency measures should always be in place. Identifying and proactively addressing the political differences can encourage collaboration and enhance project outcomes.
- ii. **Prioritization:** Prioritizing spending aligns resources with the most critical needs and development goals. Allocating resources to key sectors ensures that the community's fundamental requirements are addressed, leading to more impactful outcomes.
- iii. **Enhanced Stakeholder Engagement:** The Involvement of stakeholders throughout the planning, monitoring, and evaluation phases of a project is crucial for its success. A sense of ownership and engagement in decision-making will be felt thus, it will foster a collaborative environment and increase the likelihood of project success.

- iv. **Adaptation of Information Technology-Based Methods for Public Engagement:** There is need to utilize digital platforms and tools to enhance communication and interaction with the public, ensuring wider reach and more effective feedback mechanisms.
- v. **Engagement of Donors and Lenders for Financial Support:** Develop strategic partnerships with donors and financial institutions to secure necessary funding for projects and initiatives, ensuring sustainable financial resources.
- vi. **Implement Online Lessons and Seminars:** Transition to digital learning environments by offering online courses and seminars, making education and training more accessible and flexible for participants is necessary.
- vii. **Establish Effective Money Management Practices:** Implement robust financial management systems and practices to ensure efficient use of resources, transparency, and accountability in all financial transactions.
- viii. **Project research, evaluation and planning:** There is a need to conduct comprehensive research that would help identify community needs, do regular evaluation to ensure that the project remains on track and have a well-structured plan that outlines clear goals, timelines and efficient resource allocation.
- ix. **Linkage Between departments and Sectors:** Departments and sectors within the county must work together seamlessly. Strong inter-departmental relations facilitate coordination and prevent silos. Additionally, flexible budgets that accommodate unexpected expenses or changes in circumstances allow for smoother project implementation.

2.10 Recommendations

- i. **An efficient M&E Policy and Framework:** it should be periodically reviewed to fast-track promotion of knowledge and learning through the use of county M&E reports, disseminate project evaluation findings so as to support decision making and improve project performance.
- ii. **Adequate and Timely Funding and Private Sector Partnerships:** Adequate funding is essential for the county government to implement projects successfully. By allocating sufficient resources and partnering with the private sector, the government can leverage additional expertise, resources, and innovation. Public-private partnerships can enhance efficiency, helping to clear pending bills, subsidize animal feeds, seeds and invest in Climate-Smart Agriculture, improve access to modern equipment, support schools in implementing health policies, secure necessary funding for projects initiatives such as clean cooking technologies and energy source among others. There is also a need to prioritize high impact projects and ensure transparency in financial management to maximize the effectiveness of limited resources.
- iii. **Full end-to-end conceptualization of projects:** It should be prepared in consultation with all stakeholders for all proposed county projects. Such concept should capture all the components of the proposed project.
- iv. **Human Resource Capacity Improvement:** The county government should maximize in investing on human resources which is very essential for effective service delivery. Specialized staffing, capacity building, and rationalizing staff roles can lead to better project outcomes. Having the right skills in place ensures that tasks are performed efficiently and at a high quality. Training, Recruitment and replacement of retiring staff should be given priority.
- v. **Political Recommendations:** To foster unity and avoid mistrust among elected leaders in Meru County, a regular leadership forum should be established to facilitate collaboration on the county's development plans. Additionally, public participation is essential for identifying projects that align with the priorities of Meru County residents.
- vi. **Invest in Healthcare Services:** Enhance maternal and child health services to decrease infant mortality rates, as lower child mortality is typically associated with smaller family sizes in the long run. There is need to create a community-based health programs like mobile clinics and public

health campaigns, to directly meet local health needs and promote preventive care. Community health care workers who are familiar with local needs should also be trained to provide basic health care support, conduct outreach and assist with navigating health services. Additionally, the government should invest in local healthcare centers and clinics focusing on improving infrastructure, medical equipment, and essential service delivery at the primary level.

- vii. **Invest in waste management solutions:** The County should invest in sustainable practises, enforce regulations and promote public awareness for lasting environmental health. Stricter regulations on land use, pollution, and resource extraction should be enforced. Comprehensive waste management strategies, including recycling and composting programs, to reduce landfill waste and pollution should also be developed. Reforestation and afforestation programs to restore degraded land and improve biodiversity should also be implemented.
- viii. **Enhance Extension services:** Enhanced agricultural services will give farmers access to the best practices, weather forecasts, and marketing opportunities along with training programs to help diversify crops and reduce reliance on rain-fed agriculture. Farmers will also be able to access modern technologies in farming.
- ix. **Support Farmer Cooperative:** Encourage the formation of farmer cooperatives to strengthen collective bargaining power, increase market access and facilitate the sharing of knowledge among farmers.
- x. **Develop Comprehensive program Policies and procedures:** There is need to create clear, evidence-based policies that address the key issues facing the community, ensuring they align with both local needs and national guidelines.
- xi. **Adopting Information Technology-Based Methods such as digital platforms:** There is need to create awareness on the prioritization of the projects. The platforms therefore enhance communication and interaction with the public ensuring wider reach and more effective feedback mechanisms.

CHAPTER THREE

The Speaker is elected by the Members of the County Assembly and acts as the political head of the County Assembly as well as the Chair to the County Assembly Service Board.

The County Assembly has powers to make any laws that are necessary for, or incidental to, the effective performance of the functions and exercise of the powers of the County Government under the fourth Schedule of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010. It also provides that a County Assembly may exercise oversight over the county executive committee and any other county executive organs.

CHAPTER FIVE

MONITORING, EVALUATION AND REPORTING

5.1 Introduction

In this chapter, we introduce the monitoring and evaluation framework designed to oversee the advancement of programs and projects at the county level. This process will be facilitated by the Meru County Integrated Monitoring and Evaluation System (CIMES), which seeks to enhance the precision of tracking the execution of diverse development policies, strategies, and programs. To establish a transparent means of gauging performance, Meru County will continue to implement the established Performance Management Plan, ensuring that all commitments outlined in the ADP are converted into performance contracts with public officials within the county.

5.2 Institutional Framework to be adopted in monitoring the programmes

Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) will be overseen within individual departments and will be coordinated by both the Economic Planning unit and the Efficiency Monitoring and Evaluation unit. The framework provided by the CIMES guidelines will be employed to steer the formation of diverse mechanisms that bolster M&E functions at the County level. Initiatives to establish these mechanisms have already been initiated, exemplified by the establishment of the COMEC. Through these frameworks, the general public and implementing agencies will be actively involved in monitoring and evaluating the progress of ADP implementation.

Following the establishment of the committees responsible for Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) as detailed in the CIMES guidelines, active endeavors will be undertaken to guarantee the smooth operation of these frameworks. This will involve timely provisioning of data and information to support decision-making across different tiers. The Efficiency Monitoring Unit will collaborate closely with relevant departments to ensure the coherence of processes. Challenges, particularly those hindering efficient operations, will be promptly identified and addressed to mitigate potential bottlenecks that could impede effectiveness and the successful achievement of goals.

Efforts will be made to strengthen Monitoring and Evaluation at Sector and Departmental levels to Strengthen Results Based Management in all sectors. This will enhance the adoption of monitoring and evaluation processes that will help assess and strengthen service delivery through the provision of timely, up-to date information and also assess how well the Meru County Government is performing in terms of economic, social and political development.

5.3 Monitoring and Evaluation of Programmes

Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) will take place within individual departments, receiving support from both the Efficiency Monitoring Unit and the Department of Economic Planning. Ongoing initiatives are focused on creating a strong and comprehensive M&E system that aligns with legal requirements, policies, guidelines, and the collaborative development undertaken with the citizens of Meru County within the ADP. These efforts will leverage existing financial and human resources to ensure efficient and effective implementation. The anticipated outcome is the enhancement of accountability and transparency at all levels, ultimately contributing to the promotion of good governance.

Monitoring will involve the continuous collection, collation, and analysis of data to support reporting, informed decision-making, and evaluations. The Meru County Government is committed to fostering a culture of monitoring and evaluation across all sectors. To this end, every project will include a monitoring and evaluation component from the initial stages. Accountability in project planning will

emphasize meeting the diverse information needs and expectations of all stakeholders, including beneficiaries, managers, staff, donors, and the general public.
