TRANSFER OF GOVERNMENT PROPERTY TO  
BOARDS OF GOVERNORS OF SECONDARY  
SCHOOLS AND TEACHER TRAINING COLLEGES.

On the 16th June, 1959, the Kenya Legislative Council approved the proposals set out in Sessional Paper No. 6 of 1958/59 and thus authorized the transfer of stores and equipment to the Boards of Governors which had then been established for ten African Secondary Schools and six African Teacher Training Colleges. The same Sessional Paper explained that the Kagumo School stores were at the time of valuation included with those of the Kagumo Teacher Training College and that the Kericho School stores were purchased from the beginning by the Board of Governors.

2. Since then Boards of Governors have been established for three more Government African Secondary Schools, seven Government European Secondary Schools, and the Arab Secondary School at Mombasa. The establishment of these Boards makes it necessary to transfer to them the stores and equipment at these schools in the same way as the stores and equipment mentioned in Sessional Paper No. 6 of 1958/59.

3. It is further proposed that, in respect of all the schools and colleges affected, the land and buildings should be vested in the Trustees appointed by each Board. The land will be granted on normal leasehold terms for which the sanction of Legislative Council is not required, but as the buildings are to be transferred without charge their values are listed in the attached schedule.

N O T E S.

- (a) The value of stores and equipment given in the schedule to Sessional Paper No. 6 of 1958/59 is not repeated here.
  - (b) Before becoming a Day Secondary School, Pumwani School was a District Education Board Intermediate School, so its stores and equipment were not Government property, though the buildings were.
  - (c) The buildings at Njoro are under construction, and are expected to cost about £63,000 in all.
  - (d) The stores and equipment of the Njoro School will be regarded as belonging to the Board of Governors from the beginning.
  - (e) The Machakos Girls' Secondary School is growing out of the existing Intermediate School and the transfer of stores and equipment is a gradual process. The value quoted is an estimate of the total value of stores which have been or will be transferred.
  - (f) The buildings at Nakuru are under construction and are expected to cost £157,800 in all.
  - (g) The stores of the Nakuru High School will be regarded as belonging to the Board of Governors from the beginning.
  - (h) The stores and equipment of the Arab Secondary School are not mentioned in the Schedule because they have never been treated as Government property. They were previously administered in association with M.I.O.M.E., and have passed into the hands of the new Board of Governors.
